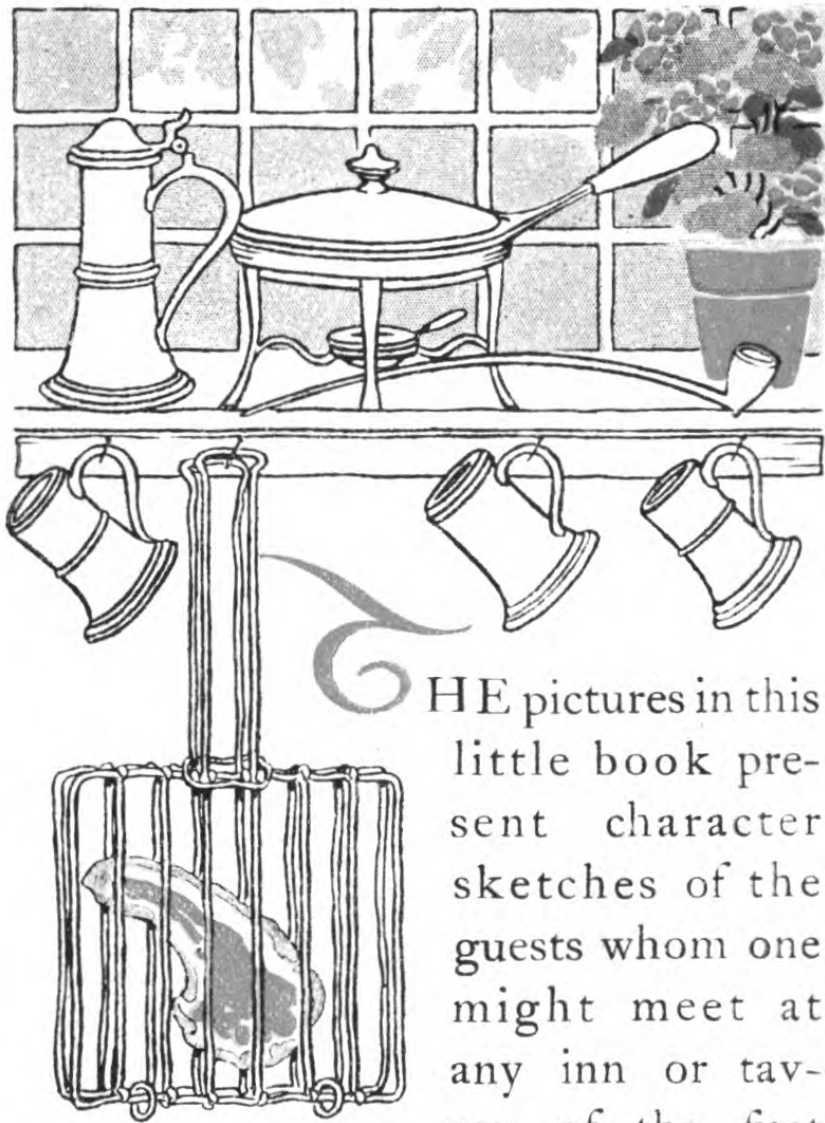

class in the year 1840.

At this time the inn was still essentially the *inn*, differing only in comfort and cleanliness from the Tabard Inn Southwark, where Chaucer's pilgrims met for their immortal Pilgrimage to Canterbury.
